Douglas Coupland Limited Edition (P. 1) Artist and writer **Douglas Coupland** has created an exclusive limited edition print especially for the Fair (£265.50 Patrons and Members).

You Never Read Alone: The Book Lovers (P. 2) Curators David Maroto and Joanna Zielinska present a reading list that considers the artist novel as a medium in its own right, displayed on a desk-sculpture by Gareth Long.

Onestar Press/Three Star Books (P. 3)

A special installation of their on-going bookshelves project. Designs by Lawrence Weiner and Gabriel Kuri and the installation includes a lamp by **Simon Starling**, a new print by Tauba Auerbach and posters by Kuri.
